## AMC commanding general: 'still a lot of work to do'

FORT BELVOIR, Va. – The commander of Army Materiel Command said it's time housing issues reflect the Army directive of people first. "If we are going to say people are the number one priority, we have to demonstrate that," said Gen. Ed Daly, after a series of meetings with privatized housing representatives and garrison leadership at The Villages at Belvoir Welcome Center. "What you do each and every day is critically important. Hold us – the U.S. Army – accountable," Daly said to representatives with the Belvoir Housing Advocacy Group.



## Summit sets way ahead for Organic Industrial Base

## AMC commander receives mission update at TACOM

DETROIT ARSENAL, Mich. – Gen. Ed Daly, commanding general Army Materiel Command, met with Brig. Gen. Darren Werner, commanding general Tank-automotive and Armaments Command, and his leadership team for a quarterly update Nov. 4. This is the first quarterly update for the two generals since both took command. Col. Santee Vasquez, TACOM Chief of Staff, brought Daly up to date on the demographic makeup for the command and what TACOM is doing to help implement the Army's Project Inclusion initiative.



## Barracks upgrades improve Soldiers' quality of life

FORT POLK, La. – At the Joint Readiness Training Center and Fort Polk, renovations to aging barracks are expected to increase the building's lifespan and improve the quality of life for unaccompanied enlisted personnel. Sidney Martin, a mechanical engineer and project leader with Fort Polk's Directorate of Public Works, said the program started with 34 barracks, and now there are eight barracks between 40 and 44 years old left, expected to be completed by fiscal year 2022, increasing the number of living spaces by 688.



## SABRE applications help Army see itself

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala. – Imagine a dashboard that allows Army leaders to see exactly where supplies are worldwide, what parts are needed, projections and demands, all in one system in almost real time. The Logistics Data Analysis Center is making this idea a reality for Army Materiel Command leaders. The Strategic Support Area Business Reporting Environment tool, or SABRE, allows Army top leaders to access information that has been quality checked by the LDAC team.

## Revitalizing Fort Hood: barracks renovations ongoing

FORT HOOD, Texas – As the Directorate of Public Works plans barracks renovations, the light can be seen at the end of the tunnel. The installation currently has 99 barracks, with beds for 15,500 Soldiers. There are 21 barracks currently under construction and another 21 slated for construction in the next few years. Brent Cabaniss, chief of DPW’s engineering division, said there’s an Army standard for new barracks, which is always their goal during renovation.
