# Gen. Daly thanks community for legacy of support

FORT BELVOIR, Va. – The first-ever financial audit of the foreign military sales business practices and processes – the most wide-sweeping official external full-scope financial statement audit ever performed on the Security Assistance Account trust fund—has begun. The Security Assistance Account – which falls under U.S. Code Title 22 – has existed for over 50 years. This account currently has over 6,500 active foreign military sales cases being managed by the Army Security Assistance Enterprise and is valued at over \$210 billion.
