## AMC holds extremism stand-down training

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala. – AMC's Commanding General, Gen. Ed Daly, facilitated a group discussion about actively eliminating extremist ideologies during a training session following Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin's military-wide extremism stand-down. Training guidance included discussion about actively eliminating ideologies that encourage discrimination, hate, and harassment against others. Goals for the training included reviewing the meaning of the Department of Defense oath, impermissible behaviors and responsibilities of reporting.

Once in Europe, the units will conduct larger JLOTS operations as part of Immediate Response.

DETROIT ARSENAL, Mich. – Over a two-day visit to Rock Island Arsenal – Joint Manufacturing and Technology Center, Tank-automotive and Armaments Command's commander, Maj. Gen. Stephen R. Lyons, commander, U.S. Transportation Command, officiated the ceremony. "Heidi is officially the youngest two-star in the U.S. Army and the first from her West Point class to attain two-star rank," said Lyons. Hoyle, who assumed command in June 2020, is SDDC's fourth female commanding general.


### SMA Grinston tours Belvoir barracks renovation

FORT BELVOIR, Va. – Sgt. Major of the Army Michael Grinston saw the original condition of the old Belvoir barracks. While touring the new barracks construction, he was pleased with the design innovations being made to provide greater convenience and safety to enlisted Soldiers, when the new barracks open for use this summer. “There’s about 450 Soldiers in these barracks, but it was designed with just 70 square feet per Soldier, and that’s not enough – the current guideline is 90 square feet,” said Garrison Command Sgt. Major Gregory Kleinholz.



### Army modernizing culinary services at installations

WASHINGTON – Soldiers may notice that things are starting to change at Army installations when it comes to food services – updated meal offerings, more accessible dining locations, and modernized payment methods are among a slew of changes that are in the works, and in many cases have begun to roll out. These changes stem from the Army’s readiness and modernization priorities and were codified in July 2019 when the Army G-4 revised Army Regulation 30-22, the Army Food Program.



### Overseas PCS requires time, thought for best result

FORT CAMPBELL, Ky. – Before having large furniture and bulky items shipped overseas, Soldiers should first visit the Fort Campbell Transportation Personal Property and Passenger Travel Office to ensure their arrangements are the right fit. “We always recommend service members, as soon as they get their orders, to either come in or call, and that way we can assess what their next step is going to be and go over the options and type of shipments they are entitled to on those orders,” said Carri Barnes, personal property supervisor.

### Two new Army apps inform and help military communities

ANSBACH, Germany – Two new mobile web applications are now available for all U.S. Army Garrison Ansbach military community members. The Digital Garrison app is the digital answer to an old-fashioned community guide with phone directory, opening hours, event listings, GPS information, local Exchange information, Exchange coupons and online shopping link, and the Army Maintenance Application is now the preferred method for all on-post housing and barracks residents to submit service orders for their quarters.

### Departing Fort Leavenworth residents need to submit notice to vacate

FORT LEAVENWORTH, Kan. – Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities is requesting that all outgoing Fort Leavenworth residents submit their notice to vacate form by April 30. “We can’t do the assignment of homes May 3 (for incoming residents) without viable notices to vacate,” said Arlene Ozores, FLFHC assistant community director. “We know who is intended to leave, but there are all kinds of exceptions.”

FORT HOOD, Texas – The III Corps and Fort Hood command team appeared on Fort Hood’s Great Big Podcast April 8 to discuss a variety of issues relating to Soldiers here and across the corps, as well as how leaders can mentor and guide them in the right direction. ## Contract audits reinforce standardization, oversight
