Senior leaders discuss sustainment future at forum

FORT LEE, Va. – Stalled by COVID-19 since 2019, the Sustainment Warfighting Forum made its comeback, drawing more than 300 in-person and virtual attendees from across the Army, including the Reserve and National Guard components. In opening remarks, Gen. Ed Daly, commanding general of Army Materiel Command, underscored the importance of the event, noting that the Army is undergoing "its largest transformation in 40 years" and the sustainment community must do the same.



Theater Army employs APS Afloat for first time in Indo-Pacific

Second barracks project at Fort McCoy, 80 percent complete

FORT McCOY, Wis. – Fourteen months after the construction of a second transient training troops barracks started at Fort McCoy, the Army Corps of Engineers-managed project has surpassed 80% completion. In a report, Ken Green with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers office at Fort McCoy said the construction of a second four-story barracks is 79% complete and remains on schedule. The barracks, funded at \$18.8 million in 2020, resembles another barracks adjacent in the 1600 block at Fort McCoy's cantonment area.



PCS season is coming - plan ahead

FORT SILL, Okla. – It's that time of the year again when Soldiers, civilians, and their families prepare for permanent change of station moves. PCS season runs from June to August and into September. Soldiers and families could see some unexpected delays in scheduling their household goods moves, said Shirley Castle, Fort Sill personal property supervisor. "Soldiers and civilians need to contact the local transportation office as soon as orders are received and keep their chain of command informed of any issues or challenges," said Castle.



Mental health advocate delivers message of hope to Fort Drum
