LOGCAP, or Logistics Civil Augmentation Program, is a program administered by ASC to provide contingency support to augment the Army force structure.

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii – The 8th Theater Sustainment Command held a rehearsal of concept drill for upcoming logistical operations in support of Pacific Pathways 2022, a series of U.S. Army Pacific led exercises that support security in the Indo-Pacific region. \$7.8 million grant earmarked to assist transitioning troops

KILLEEN, Texas – The Texas Workforce Commission has provided \$7.8 million to fund a two-year program that will assist Soldiers, military spouses, active duty military spouses and recently-separated veterans with transitioning out of military life. The funds cover work-related expenses, such as the purchase of clothes for a veteran's first civilian job, the cost of tools they may need, tuition expenses, exams and licensures, as well as lodging and travel expenses for when the veteran goes out of the region for training.

FORT HAMILTON, N.Y. – Months after the remnants of Hurricane Ida flooded New York City with record-breaking rainfall, Fort Hamilton is on the road to recovery from storm damage. The stretch of repeated flooding included tropical storms Elsa, Henri and Ida. For Fort Hamilton, Ida left behind multiple sinkholes on streets and parking lots, and led to the collapse of a bluff. With an immediate need to update infrastructure and repair damages, Fort Hamilton executed a \$1.98 million contract to start construction.

USAG Bavaria doubles down on conservation efforts

GRAFENWOEHR, Germany – U.S. Army Garrison Bavaria pivoted into 2022 with a more dedicated focus on energy and water conservation, following Army Materiel Command's first-ever Energy and Utilities Summit. "The operationalization of energy at installations is absolutely critical. We have to have resilient, hardened and modernized installations to project power and protect our force," AMC Commanding General Gen. Ed Daly said at the summit.

Excess Army equipment brings new capabilities to Greek allies

ATHENS, Greece – U.S. foreign policy to provide capabilities to allies and partners was demonstrated recently when Greece received an initial 44 M117 Guardian Armored Safety Vehicles, the first of a two-part Foreign Military Sales case that will deliver 1,200 vehicles. The Army uses FMS to facilitate divestiture of excess equipment, while simultaneously building partner capacity. The U.S. Army Security Assistance Command executes Army FMS.

Garrison's bird strike prevention keeping aircraft safe

WIESBADEN, Germany – U. S. Army Garrison Wiesbaden Directorate of Public Works has maintained an aviation bird strike prevention program since 2016, resulting in a definite downward trend in the number of bird strikes on aircraft. The Garrison's program supports Installation Management's vision to provide quality services to support a safe and healthy infrastructure and environment in which to live and work.
